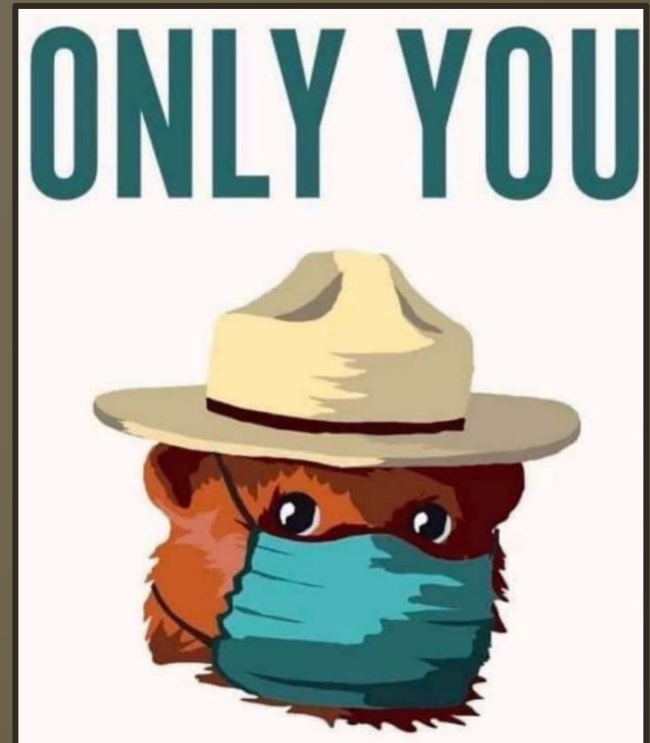
Fire District Briefing: Seasonal Fire Restrictions & Precautions

What are Burning Ban/Restrictions?

- A burning ban is a restriction issued for a specified part of the state under extremely dry conditions in which existing burning permits are canceled and new permits not issued. Burning in approved burners, recreational fires, and even smoking outdoors may be prohibited, depending on the fire danger.
 - May be modified by weather conditions.
 - Will change during fire season (as ODF determines).
 - Complete burn bans may be required during extreme weather conditions for community protection.



Local Burning Restrictions

- Check with local fire district/departments for specific restrictions for your area (contact roster – [click here](#)).
- Lincoln County generally moves to county wide – full burn ban around the first week of July...but could be issued earlier.
- Public is notified via Lincoln Alerts, media releases, social media updates and posted on Fire District webpages.

What is Fire Weather?

- Typically, spring, summer and fall
- May be driven by periods of low moisture
- May be driven by high winds
- Driven by unseasonable high temperatures
- Extreme fire conditions occur during **Red Flag Warnings** requiring extra caution and early calls to 911



Red Flag Warning

The NWS issues a Red Flag Warning, in conjunction with land management agencies, to alert people to an ongoing or expected **critical fire weather** pattern.

Critical fire conditions are either **occurring now, or will shortly**.

Be extremely careful with open flames.

Take action.

- A **Red Flag Warning** is issued to alert fire officials and firefighters of potentially dangerous ***fire weather conditions within the next 12 to 24*** hours. They are issued when the following three criteria are met:
 - Surface relative humidity (RH) less than 30 % for VA and MD; RH less than or equal to 25% for WV AND
 - Sustained surface wind of 20 MPH or greater AND
 - 0-hour fuel moisture less than 8% for VA; less than or equal to 8% for MD and WV

- A **Fire Weather Watch** is issued to alert fire officials and firefighters of ***potentially dangerous fire weather conditions within the next 24 to 36*** hours. They are issued when the following three criteria are met:
 - Surface relative humidity (RH) less than 30 % for VA and MD; RH less than or equal to 25% for WV AND
 - Sustained surface wind of 20 MPH or greater AND
 - 10-hour fuel moisture less than 8% for VA; less than or equal to 8% for MD and WV

Understanding Watches/Warnings



- **Red Flag Warning:** Take Action. Be extremely careful with open flames. NWS issues a Red Flag Warning, in conjunction with land management agencies, to alert land managers to an ongoing or imminent critical fire weather pattern. NWS issues a Red Flag Warning when fire conditions are ongoing or expected to occur shortly.
- **Fire Weather Watch:** Be Prepared. A Watch alerts land managers and the public that upcoming weather conditions could result in extensive wildland fire occurrence or extreme fire behavior. A watch means critical fire weather conditions are possible but not imminent or occurring.
- **Extreme Fire Behavior:** This alert implies a wildfire likely to rage out of control. It is often hard to predict these fires because such they behave erratically, sometimes dangerously. One or more of the following criteria must be met:
 - Moving fast: High rate of spread
 - Prolific crowning and/or spotting
 - Presence of fire whirls
 - Strong convection column

THE SPEED OF WILDFIRES

SPOTTING

Wind and thermals can carry sparks and firebrands downwind of fires, greatly increasing spread rates.

WEATHER CONDITIONS

Wind speed has a huge effect on fire intensity and how fast fires travel. Wind pushes the flame forward and closer to the unburned fuel in front of the fire. Temperature, humidity, and precipitation are also important due to their strong influence on fuel moisture content.

FUEL TYPE

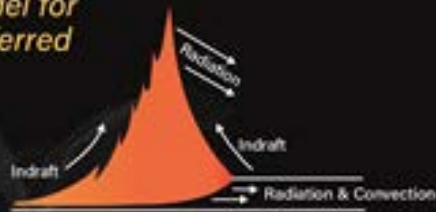
The type of vegetation along with the fuel moisture content, physical properties, and chemical properties play a role in fire behavior and how fast fires spread.

TOPOGRAPHY

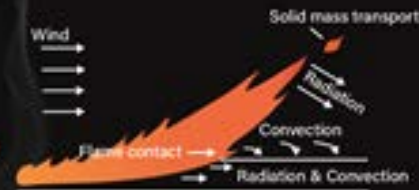
Slope steepness affects fire behavior in a similar way as wind by changing the flame angle. Elevation and aspect are also important in determining how fires spread.

Rothermel's model for how heat is transferred and fires spread.

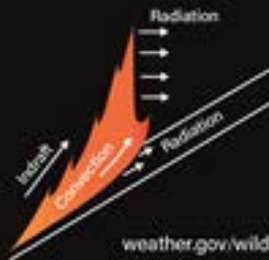
Schematic of no-wind fire

What to do!



- **If you cause a fire:**
 - Attempt to extinguish with water and/or shovel of dirt/sand if safe to do so.
 - Call 911 to report the fire - know your address, landmarks, road mile markers.
 - Evacuate the immediate area and notify neighbors if safe to do so.



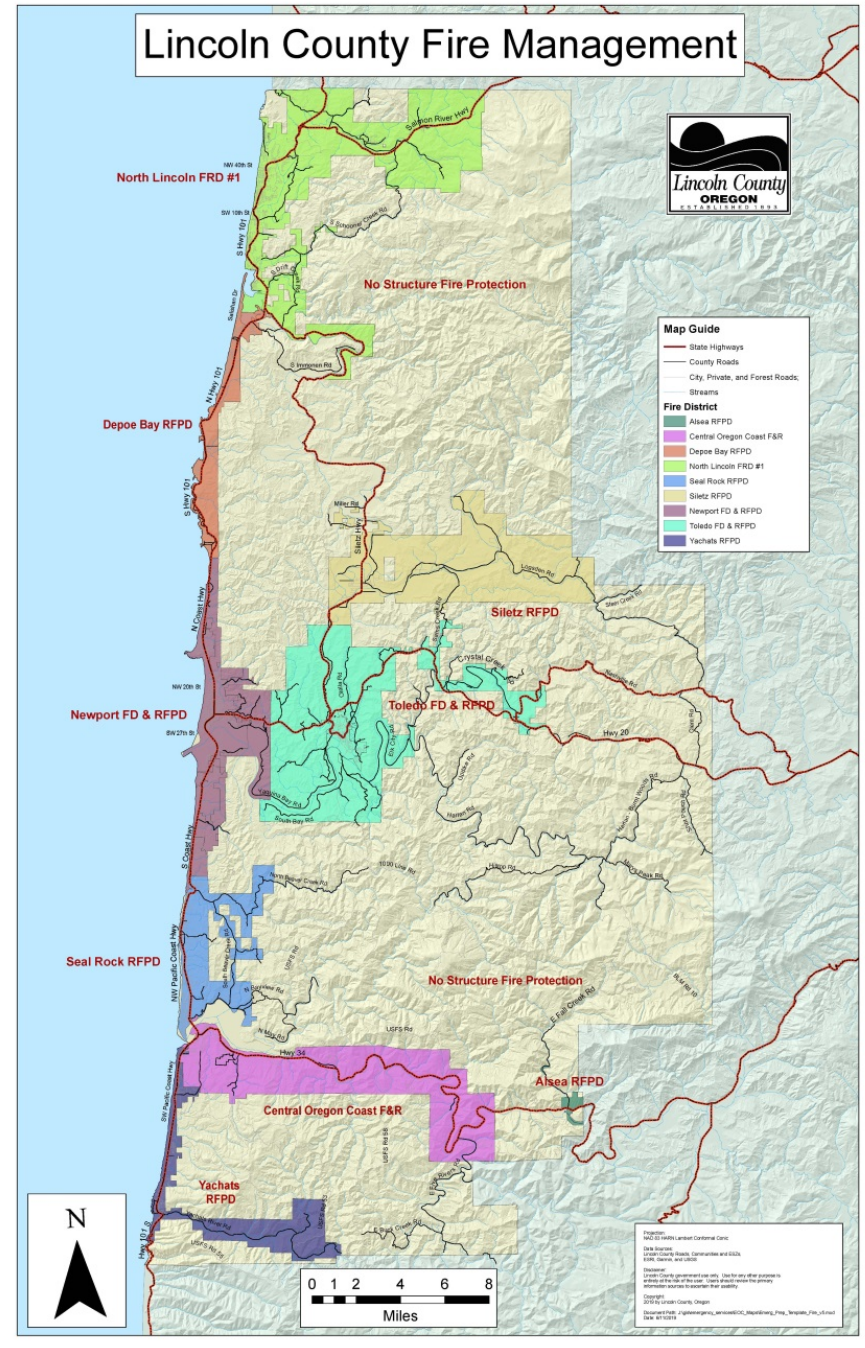
What to do!

- If you see smoke at **a distance** in a **rural or isolated area**:
 - Call your local fire district/ODF station to determine if it is a prescribed burn or if it has been reported.
 - You can monitor/check prescribed burns at this website – save bookmark on your phone
- If you see an unattended, unobserved fire or heavy smoke **nearby** your location call the non-emergency Dispatch number and give the location and pertinent information. *Bookmark this number in your phone
- If there *is an immediate threat to life or safety, call 911.*

When calling from landline or cell phone	- Speak clearly, be calm – when a caller is upset, it is hard to understand what they are saying or to get vital information quickly - State which emergency service is needed and why (e.g. Fire, Police, Ambulance) - State your exact physical address (where you are at the time of the emergency) <i>Mobile (cell) Phone Calls:</i> If you do not know the exact address look for landmarks, i.e., mile markers, addresses on mailboxes, street signs, highway signs, nearby parks, businesses, etc. - Stay on the line until your Call Taker tells you to disconnect <i>If calling from mobile (cell) phone and you are driving, pull to the side of the road and stop before calling</i>		
If you can't speak or hear when calling 911	- After dialing, leave the phone off the hook and make noise to let the Call Taker (Dispatcher) know you have an emergency - Calling from a landline (hard wired phone): Your address will appear on the call taker's screen - Calling from a mobile (cell) phone: The Call Taker may get latitude/longitude close to your location - Text-to- 911: Give clear identifiers to where you are located and what your emergency is		
Public Safety Tips	- Make sure your address is: - Visible on the outside of your house or at roadway, especially at night - Posted in your home for guests or babysitters to use if they are calling from a mobile phone - Teach children when to call 911, when not to and their home address; be sure a phone is within reach and they know where to find it - Keep mobile phones secure so they don't accidentally call 911; but if that happens do not hang up, stay on the line and explain the situation to the Call Taker - Deactivated cell phones still call 911, they are not toys. Remove the battery if you can or keep them away from children

- **Know your evacuation:** levels [\[English\]](#) [\[Spanish\]](#) and steps to take:
 - Level 1 – Be READY
 - Level 2 – Be SET
 - Level 3 – GO NOW



Wildfire Be Ready Tips

- **Have a Plan in Place:**
 - Prepare for wildfires – Plan, Build a Go Kit, Communications
- **EARLY evacuation** is the key for those with pets, animals, access and functional needs households.
- **Comply with local warnings** about evacuations – **Don't wait** until the last minute to evacuate
- Don't underestimate **how fast fire progresses!**

Prevent human-caused wildfires

When fire season goes into effect, some activities in the great outdoors are prone to start fires. In an effort to prevent these fires from starting, the Oregon Department of Forestry and our partners impose restrictions pertaining to public and work related activities. Areas outside ODF protection, such as the USDA Forest Service, will provide links to other agency fire regulation information.

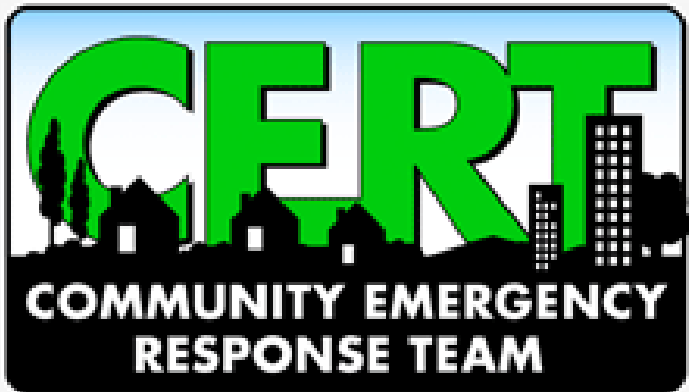

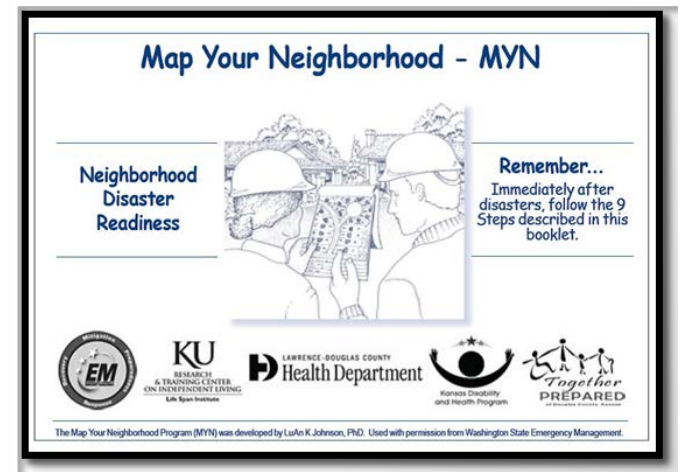

Yachats Emergency Preparedness Committee 2021 Goals

1. Work with Yachats Rural Fire Protection District to establish a cache and evacuation site at the new fire station.
2. Evaluate existing caches north and south of the bridge for location and replace containers and update contents as needed.
3. Investigate possibility of using Cape Ranch Road property for south cache.
4. Host a series of informative webinars for the Yachats community on Emergency topics to increase personal preparedness.
5. Fulfill certification requirements by conducting a tabletop exercise.
6. Review the Emergency Operations Plan and update as needed.

Yachats Emergency Preparedness Committee 2020 Goals

1. Update Incident Staff descriptions by November 2020
2. Develop Tsunami Evacuation Plan by December 2020
3. Update the list of City Staff and City Volunteers who have completed FEMA/NIMS training
4. Refresh contents of North and South storage containers by August 2020
5. Develop projects to address the lessons learned during the September 2019 Table Top Exercise before December 2020

Yachats Emergency Preparedness Committee Functions

1. Maintain the City's Storm Ready and Tsunami Ready certification
2. Conduct events and exercises to improve City resilience when an emergency occurs
3. Conduct events and exercises to improve Citizen awareness of how to cope with an emergency event
4. Maintain a working liaison with the Yachats Rural Fire Protection District
5. Maintain a working liaison with Lincoln County organizations on Emergency Preparedness
6. Maintain a list of City Staff and Citizens who completed FEMA/NIMS training courses
